Spiritual Formation & Education

Rejoice! Reflections on Four Seasonal Hymns Explore the rich emotional and experiential meaning of the lyrics to some of the most beloved hymns of the Christmas season.

3rd Sunday of Advent, December 13: **“O Little Town of Bethlehem,”** led by Rev. Dr. Dan Klingler

Rev. Phillips Brooks was so moved by a trip to Palestine that he penned the lyrics to this hymn around 1868. His Philadelphia church’s music director, Lewis Redner, wrote the music. This session uses the hymn as a starting off point for discussion about dichotomies, apparent contradictions that exist in our faith lives. For instance, we are people of faith, yet we also harbor doubts. We are people of mercy, but we also hold others in judgment.

4th Sunday of Advent, December 20: **“Hark! The Herald Angels Sing,”** led by Rev. John Smart

Charles Wesley and the rest of the team that assembled this great hymn meant for it to take us to soaring places when we sang it, but having reached those places they hoped as well that we would be changed by them. This hymn makes a number of assumptions about who Jesus was, why he was born, and what the purpose was of his ministry. In this final session, participants will identify meaningful phrases and statements about Jesus from the hymn.

This 2009 *Thoughtful Christian* series explains the history behind some of our favorite carols and helps groups encounter the rich wording anew. Focusing on the ways in which words and music can speak to the core of our experiences, groups will spend time in reflection, conversation, and simple enjoyment of these beloved hymns.

We give thanks to Rev. Lorraine Stuart for facilitating the class on **“O Come, O Come, Emmanuel”** and to Larry Rauch, who shared his reflections and inspirations in writing and recording his own composition of this hymn. Our gratefulness also to Rev. William Hoffman for leading us in **“Silent Night, Holy Night”** on the 2nd Sunday in Advent.

December study focus in Children's Ministry

Treasure Quest (9 a.m. Service – K-3rd grade) will explore a Gospel comparison of the Christmas story. We will explore the story from Joseph's point of view as told in Matthew complete with visiting kings, from Mary's point of view as told in Luke represented by lowly shepherds, and the luminous telling of John. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen His glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth" (John1:1, 13) God finds many voices to spread the good news. And what is the good news of the Christmas story? Emmanuel, God among us, in the flesh.

Session Highlights

At its November 17 meeting, Session:

- Enjoyed a delicious meal at the home of Teddie Allison.
- Rejoiced that the Presbytery of the Cascades voted at their November 13-14 meeting in Medford to approve FPC Bend's request to set aside Presbytery's policy to not ordain a person who is currently employed in a similar staff position and to make an exception in this case and to approve the ordination of Greg Bolt. During dinner Greg related his experiences at the Presbytery meeting to elders.
- Received an update of the results of the Hope Rising! Stewardship campaign. Dr. Koski expressed appreciation for the hard work done by elders in organizing the campaign.
- Received a report from John Clark, chair of the Audit Committee, on the 2008 audit. The scope of the audit was primarily related to reviewing cash receipts and disbursements from an internal control point of view. Session moved to confirm the internal control process as previously approved in November 2008 with the addition of random tests performed during the year to confirm the Accounting Procedures and Practices are fully in place.
- Learned that the Spiritual Formation Team has implemented some of the recommendations that came out of the October 17 Session retreat discussions.
- Heard a report from Dr. Koski that he would be participating in the ordination of Greg Bolt in West Virginia on Sunday, December 6.
- Approved holding the Annual Gathering of the church at Bend Senior High School on Saturday, January 30, 2010.
- Approved the 2010 fundraising calendar and the 2010 Session meeting calendar.
- Received a report on the hiring of a pastor for the Trailhead Ministry. They have hired Zack Hancock, who is currently living in Loveland, Colorado; and he will begin his position on January 1. He is currently working as a carpenter and as the director of campus ministry at the University of Northern Colorado.

Christmas Joy Offering

Presbyterian Pan American School at Kingsville, Texas, is one of six racial and ethnic schools founded by the Presbyterian Church and supported by the Christmas Joy Offering (CJO). The CJO will be taken at our church on December 20th.

Dr. Jim Matthews, who is the president at Pan Am, received his doctorate from Vanderbilt University. He served at four Presbyterian-related institutions before going to South Texas. What follows is an excerpt from a longer article written by Dr. Matthews: I arrived at Presbyterian Pan American School on a dismal fall day over 10 years ago. If you grasp

the logic of sending a college administrator to a secondary school, an Irish scholar to a primarily Hispanic institution, then you understand the Presbyterian way better than I did at the time. God doesn't call the well-suited, instead God re-tailors those called. And it didn't take me long to hear what I can only label a call to mission. Pan Am has been around for a long time – [almost] 100 years since the daughter of a Presbyterian missionary carved out a portion of the King Ranch for the church to build a school for Mexican boys and 50 years since another Presbyterian, ordained son of missionaries himself, merged that boys vocational institute with a similar school for girls nearby to form an International Co-Educational College Preparatory School to prepare young men and women from the Americas and beyond for lives of Christian leadership.

The dorms are actually over capacity thanks to the addition of bunk beds. We have students from Korea, Taiwan, Thailand and Equatorial Guinea and Rwanda, along with kids from Mexico, Guatemala and Ecuador. We are in the midst of a campaign to rebuild the campus. Plans include new dorms and classroom buildings capable of holding up to 300 students, a new assembly hall, gymnasium, and campus center and a larger dining hall. Our vision is the mission and the mission is the kids:

Missionary's son — now a U.S. Ambassador

Girl from Mexico — now an assistant to the Secretary General of the U.N.

Boy from Romania — now finishing his doctorate in biomedical engineering

Girl from Texas — now an attorney, who is an elder in a small Hispanic church

Boy from Guatemala — now a physician leading a medical missionary organization in Central America

Soon world leaders will be meeting in Copenhagen to thrash out a new global climate agreement. There are several ways you can weigh in on the decisions to be made. One you may consider is to join with members of other churches and the community in a candle light vigil at Brandis Square (corner of Newport and Wall) 2:00 pm on Saturday December. 12. Bring your candles in a small jar to assure they stay lit, or bring battery lights. We will have signs, but it is always good to make and bring your own. DREAMING OF A GREEN CHRISTMAS

At a time when many of us are trying to reduce our impact on God's creation, Christmas provides an excellent opportunity to start ecologically-minded traditions. The Green Team offers some ideas to help celebrate the season while caring for the earth.

- Did you know that the 2.6 billion cards sold in the US during the Christmas season would fill a football field 10 stories high and requires the harvesting of nearly 300,000 trees? When purchasing Christmas cards, look for those made from recycled material, or buy cards that donate a portion of proceeds to a good cause. You might also consider emailing Christmas cards. You can send photo and holiday e-cards using sites like BlueMountain.com and Amazon.com.
- Buy more locally made gifts. Local craft fairs and artisan shops are a good source for gifts that come without the added environmental impacts of transportation from other parts of the world, use less packaging and help support the local economy.
- Need new Christmas lights this year? Consider purchasing LED (Light Emitting Diode) lights, which use up to 90% less energy than larger traditional holiday bulbs and last up to 100,000 hours. LED holiday lights use .04 watts per bulb, 10 times less than mini bulbs and 100 times less than traditional holiday bulbs. Over a 30-day period, lighting 500 traditional holiday lights will cost you about \$18 while the same number of LED lights costs only \$0.19. As an added bonus, if one of the LED lights burns out the rest of the strand will stay lit.
- Use environmentally friendly wrapping paper made from recycled content. Avoid buying glossy foil or metallic wrapping paper which is difficult to recycle. Save bows, ribbons and gift bags to reuse next year. Also, don't forget to recycle discarded wrapping and tissue paper, cardboard boxes and holiday cards.
- Recycle your Christmas tree. Many local Boy Scout troops will collect the trees for recycling, or you can take your tree to Deschutes Recycling at the Knott Landfill, Negus Transfer Station in Redmond, Northwest Transfer Station between Tumalo and Sisters, or Southwest Transfer Station located between Sunriver and La Pine. Trees cannot have tinsel or flocking.

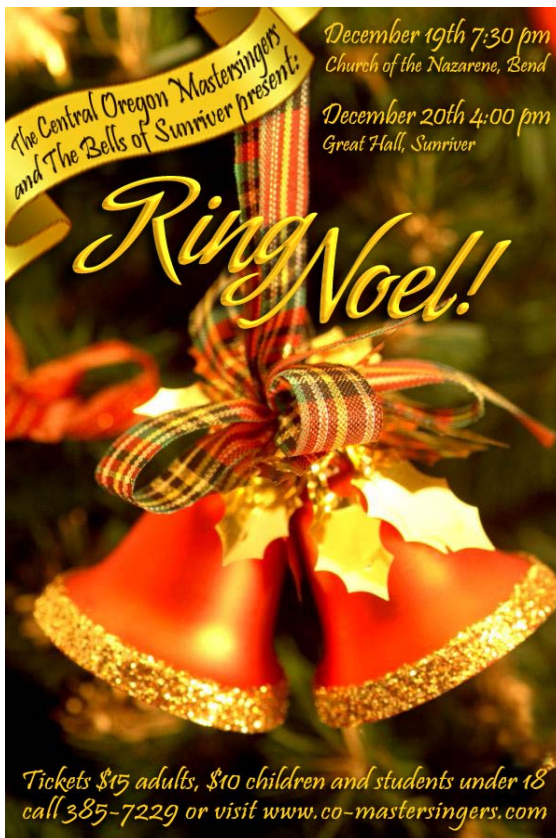
Prayer Chain

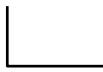
